## **OVERVIEW**

This is the report of the private tour we made with Brian and Lyn Reid, two Australians in their seventies – but as healthy as you would like!- who visited Chile during early September after spending the previous days at a Conference in the neighbouring country, Argentina. They were interested in discovering Chilean birds and taking some photos ...birders not listers!

We arranged 2 days which gave them the chance to see some contrasts in the landscape of Central Chile, starting in the Andean hills just above Santiago and then continuing to the coast where we birded in the estuary of one the most important rivers in the area and also in one of the well preserved ravines in the middle of the most people pressured places in Chile.

Overall we managed to spot 85 species and to enjoy some of the best birding places in the Santiago area.

## **ITINERARY**

## <u>Day 1</u>

We met at o6:45 and headed straight out to the east of the city up to reach the beginning of Farellones Road, the 32 km paved road which connects the capital city with the major ski resort area of the country. Still in the winter, daybreak was around 8 o'clock, so we had the chance to look for some night-birds and had success with some Austral Pygmy-Owls.

With the first sunlight we walked through the brushland looking for the first endemics, Moustached Turca and Chilean Tinamou. In this cold and foggy day the first attempt was not as good as usual, and just gave us some "heard" records. By way of compensation the landscape was stunning with some dense clouds entering through the valley, obscuring some of the hairpin-curves of the road that was at our feet.

Then we birded at Yerba Loca Park, where we spotted the endemic Moustached Turca and White-throated Tapaculo and other good birds such as Long-tailed Meadowlark plus two rodent species: the guinea pig-looking Degu and an all black burrowing rodent called Cururo, both endemics of the country.

After a homemade picnic lunch we came back to the main road and kept driving up to Farellones area at 2200 mts over above sea level where we found one of the targets of the day, the Andean Condor, and some other good birds; Plumbeous Sierra-Finch, Darkfaced Ground-Tyrant, Gray-flanked Cinclodes and Black-billed Shrike-Tyrant.

On our way down we made our last stop for a successful search for the endemic Crag Chilia. After this we followed the road back to Santiago to reach the Hotel at 5:30 in the afternoon.

## Day 2

We started at same time as first day but this time we headed southwest of the city to the harbour of San Antonio. Some kilometers from there we birded at Maipo estuary, one of the main river mouths in the central area and recognized as one the best birding destinations into the country.

The place was even better than usual and we had a great morning there, enjoying 3 hours of first class birding. We were able to spot some early spring visitors as Black-bellied Plover, Black Skimmer and Willet, and other good birds such as 2 endemics, the Dusky Tapaculo and the Seaside Cinclodes, the desert-nesting Gray Gull and the jewel like Many-colored Rush-Tyrant.

At mid-morning we visited Cartagena Lagoon where we got Black-necked and Coscoroba Swan, and then visited a valley which holds a remnant of native vegetation where the birding was excellent adding birds as Green-backed Firecrown, Giant Hummingbird, Des-Mur's Wiretail, Dusky-tailed Canastero, Thorn-tailed Rayadito, Patagonian Tyrant and Rufous-tailed Plantcutter.

After a pleasurable birding day we came back Santiago around 5:30 and said good bye each other and see you next time.
